The <u>Great Big Green Week</u> (GBGW) is an annual, week-long climate festival, this year taking place from 10th - 18th June 2023. It is the UK's biggest-ever celebration of community action to tackle climate change and protect nature.

Local events will take place all over the UK involving many different people who are all passionate about tackling climate change and protecting nature. Not only will the week dominate the media, but it is also a significant moment in the year to raise our voices to influence and inspire local politicians to take action for climate change and nature. We can use Great Big Green Week as a vital moment to urge our politicians to champion a particular area, such as home energy efficiency or biodiversity, in their work. This is especially important now, thinking ahead to the 2024 General Election Campaigns and shaping the future climate agenda. The more they hear from you, the higher climate change will rise on the Government's agenda both locally and nationally.

## Why it's important to engage your local politicians this Great Big Green Week

You have a powerful role to play in educating your Members of Parliament (MPs) and Councillors. You can inform them about local and national issues, as well as providing a constituency mandate for action - the more people that raise their voice, the more powerful the message. Through facilitating hundreds of meetings with local politicians, we know that they often feel as though their constituents have a general concern about climate, but often little guidance as to what action voters would like to see. Your voice matters in translating this general message into tangible and concrete action that your MP can take.



Great Big Green Week is a great opportunity to invite your local politician to an event you're running or attending, or arrange a meeting with them to move climate change and the environment higher up their agenda. Meeting your local politician prior to Great Big Green Week is a chance to tell them about all of the week's activities happening in your local area, and how much community support there is for local climate action, encouraging them to get involved.

Local politicians represent you, your community and your needs. They are decision-makers and work alongside those who have the power to call for the funding and policy changes needed within councils, government and more, to fulfil your requests. Talking to your local representatives about climate change helps to provide them with a mandate to act and can help you achieve the change you want to see.





At Hope for the Future, we've supported thousands of people over the last 10 years to speak to their local politicians about climate change and the environment, and we have a track record of helping people see real, tangible action in parliament, as well as within local councils and more. You can see just a few examples of this positive action below.





## Campaigning for Clean Air in Oldham

After receiving Hope for the Future's training and support, a group of Bangladeshi women from Oldham, called the Climate Connections Women's Group, organised an event in December 2022 to focus on their children's right to clean air in their local area. The group's artwork was displayed around the venue which showcased "life in rich countries" and the "impact on poor countries" while highlighting the need to plant more trees.

Local Councillor, Abdul Jabbar, Deputy Leader of Oldham Council and Cabinet Member for Finance and Low Carbon attended the event where he heard the women's group's concerns and ideas on reducing air pollution in the area and implementing 'schools streets'. He acknowledged that 'school streets' are a contentious issue on the council and community support is an important part of implementing them. As a result of the Women's Groups work so far, Cllr Jabbar has now committed to meeting the women to discuss reducing air pollution on school streets.

There really is power in involving your local politicians in your community conversations about local action for climate and nature. If you're interested in asking your local politician to attend your event, you can use our helpful guide and checklist on our website.

#### **Climate Focus Groups in St Ives**

In 2018, Hope for the Future supported a constituent group in St Ives, West Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly to organise an event focusing on local nature data. The group invited their local MP, Derek Thomas, and the event was a huge success in opening up a dialogue between local residents and their MP. The group were able to find initial common ground with their MP on home energy efficiency given Derek's background in housebuilding, but have since progressed to talking together about a whole range of issues relating to climate change and nature. Following conversations with his constituent group, Derek wrote an article in Conservative Home about the power of solar energy. Through developing a relationship with Derek on this area of common interest, regular 'Climate Focus' sessions have been taking place since March 2021. These are a space for the group to discuss climate issues more generally with their MP, and expert speakers were invited along to provide Derek with the knowledge he needed to advocate for the group in parliament. Through these regular meetings, they've been able to meet with Alok Sharma MP, George Eustice MP, local campaign groups, the Cornwall Mayor and many more, discussing local and national climate issues. This initial event has been a catalyst for meaningful local conversations, with Derek taking forward the group's ideas and concerns to parliament.





For example, in January this year he was one of only two Conservative MPs to speak in Caroline Lucas's Westminster Hall debate about fossil fuels and the cost of living, in which he spoke for 10 minutes and began by saying to tackle the cost of living crisis and the climate change the best solution is to improve the energy efficiency of our homes.
